Your trust will give your baby confidence which is an essential skill for social bonding and the future of your child.

Another way to help babies begin to learn social skills, stay safe, and begin to learn values and morals is to provide appropriate discipline from birth. Most healthy babies develop new skills in a completely natural and continually surprising way. Newborn babies may be more developed than we think ...

Babies have two sleep states, an in-between sleep-wake state, and three wake states. At first the states are hard to tell apart, but they become more clear as the baby grows. The amount of time a baby spends in each state also changes as the baby grows. Both of these patterns of change reflect the gradual maturing of the brain and nervous system.

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
